


Unfortunately, dental disease in dogs and cats is often overlooked, and many people assume that bad breath is normal. Periodontal disease is by far the number one health problem in our cats and dogs.

It is important to consider dental hygiene as a another key component in your pet's overall heath, together with things like nutrition, proper exercise and routine grooming. Our pets rely on us to provide them with good oral health care and give them their best lives.

Dental disease can also be involved in many other diseases including kidney, liver and heart disease, due to bacteria travelling through the bloodstream.

How to know if your pet has dental disease:

- •Halitosis (bad breath)
- Increased salivation
- •Red and/or puffy gums
- •Tartar / Calculus
- •Reluctance to chew / crying out when chewing
- Bleeding gums
- •Missing or loose teeth
- Behavioral changes such as a reduction in grooming in cats

Antifreeze Poisoning in Cats and



Cats and dogs are attracted to the sweet taste of ethylene glycol. Many will voluntarily drink antifreeze if it is spilled or leaks onto the garage floors and driveways and more are than ready to like the product from contaminated paws and coats.

A small quantity of concentrated antifreeze can result in signs within an hour.

Signs include:-

- Depression
- Incoordination
- Vomiting
- Sometimes excessive thirst and urination
- These signs can be followed by muscle tremors
- Within 12 24 hours can lead to acute renal failure
- Seizure and death can quickly follow
